Helgi will campaign to reduce the impact of cars on our town and work to make the centre more attractive for people who wish to walk and cycle in Weybridge.

"If the town centre becomes a more pleasant place to be, more people will be drawn there and will stay there longer, making it better for businesses catering to local needs." The importance of our town centre to the quality of our lives, has been underlined by the recent shift from commuting to working from home, brought about by the pandemic. Helgi used to commute to London, only being able to enjoy Weybridge in the evenings and at weekends. Like many Weybridge residents, Helgi now spends more weekday time working from home. With more people spending more time in their local area, Helgi believes it is important that Weybridge is a vibrant town that provides more and different services and inspires people.

Helgi loves the wealth of open green space in the centre of town and along the town's rivers and canals. He is particularly concerned that these should be accessible to all and that the water in our local rivers should be clean. He has campaigned and will continue to work with councillors and local people to put pressure on government to ensure that our waterways are free from sewage outflows so that all river users can enjoy this wonderful amenity in safety. He knows that when it is done well, people and nature can work in harmony.

Helgi is also keen to highlight the heritage of Weybridge, which has been home to writers and

musicians as well as to motoring and aviation pioneers - as can be seen at Brooklands Museum. He would love to see our town flourish with more cultural and live entertainment.

Helgi says: "I love Weybridge and want to protect all that is great about the town. I'll work hard to bring in much-needed improvements to make it even better."


Protecting green spaces and character of Weybridge

Working for you

The environment portfolio

Elmbridge is to slash the carbon footprint of big CO2 emitter Xcel Leisure Centre as part of its commitment to fight climate change.

In July 2019 the Lib Dems on Elmbridge Council initiated a local focus on the Climate Emergency which was approved by full council and, following an audit, the council adopted its first Carbon Management and Reduction Plan in 2020.

In May this year I had the privilege of taking on responsibility for the Environment Portfolio and was keen to make speedier progress on implementing proposals in this plan. This year, working closely with officers and with the cross-party Climate Change Panel, we have secured sufficient money within the council budget to take forward a number of carbon reduction measures. With nearly a million pounds allocated in the February budget, we are now in a position to move forward with

projects including: installing solar panels on the Civic Centre and Community Centres; additional insulation at Community Centres and installing electric vehicle charging points at these locations. Further EV charging points will be installed at Churchfields car park over the next few weeks.

Significantly, we shall also be installing solar panels on the roof of the Xcel Leisure Centre - the Council's biggest emitter of CO2. We expect this will give an annual saving of around £50,000 and 77 tonnes of CO2 and expect to recoup the cost of

the installation within six years.

With fuel prices going up, we are reassured that we have made sound decisions for both climate reduction and future cost savings.

My first year as a councillor

It has certainly been a busy year. In June I joined Vicki in organising the first Weybridge Community Fair. The weather was kind, crowds attended, and I saw

there was more we could do. So I'm doing it again. This year the "Weybridge Jubilee Fair and Arts Festival" plus a dog show will fill Churchfields park on June 25th. It will be a day of music, fun and community!

Organising further events in support of young people's mental health and planting trees in memory of those lost to Covid certainly felt worthwhile.

However, frustration strikes when addressing planning issues particularly when residents are faced with rogue builders. Working on the licensing committee has also been interesting, but annoying when much needed decisions are blocked and become a focus for party political point scoring. A case in point was blocking a fee increase that would enable taxi licences to be processed faster. Planning and licensing are important ways in which councillors can protect local residents from some developers and businesses who have little regard for the misery they can cause. One recent hard fought licensing decision has protected residents from noisy concerts, unsociable behaviour and has improved safety.

Driving change for the better always feels good, but it is exhausting! I hope the next few years will allow me to do more. I will certainly miss my mentor and friend Vicki Macleod who has taught me so much. However, it will be a pleasure to add Helgi's positive attitude and energy to our Riverside team of councillors.

Four years in office

However, what local councillors deal with can affect the quality of our day to day lives in close-up. Much of a councillor's work is invisible while we are doing it and bringing about change takes time, but the results are worthwhile. In my time as your councillor, the most significant of these have been: the creation of our new Local Plan, which will influence and shape the quality of the environment we live and work in over the next 15 years; the completion of the cycle and walkway from the station to the centre of Weybridge (work on this started long before I became a councillor); the Elmbridge Climate Emergency declaration – authored by my friend and colleague Andrew Davis (RIP) – which is now bearing fruit under the stewardship of local councillor Ashley Tilling. We also celebrated the opening of the Broadwater Path, a project worked on by former Lib Dem councillors over many years.

Our efforts do have a tangible and more immediate impact when it comes to planning decisions. In the Queen's Road area, we are pleased that we have been able to protect existing residents from increases in parking stress from developments with inadequate parking.

At an even more close-up level, ward councillors can have an impact by responding to issues and concerns of local residents, either on matters that affect the town or on matters that affect them personally. I am grateful that, as a councillor, my interventions have helped.

I am delighted that Helgi Joensen has agreed to stand for election. I am confident that he will continue to contribute to the well being of our town and of individual residents.
